



REFLECTIONS FROM THE CLERGY: MY PRILGRIMAGE TO IRELAND

I am pleased to report that I had an absolutely brilliant and beautiful time in Ireland on vacation, pilgrimage, and in concert. As I mentioned in my sermon upon my return, I visited a holy site called 'Saint Brigid's Well'. It is a holy well, of which there are many in Ireland. This well was consecrated by Saint Brigid herself; the female patron saint of Ireland. The water from the well is said to have healing properties, and I believe it. I filled up a couple of water bottles with it and carried it all throughout my journeys to use to bless people and offer prayers of healing. In all my travels to Ireland over the years, I had not made pilgrimage to Brigid's well until now. I encourage you to look up Saint Brigid and read about her sanctified life.

2023 ANNUAL MEETING - RECTOR'S REPORT

Annual Report 2023 November 19, 2023

I'm sure that many of you saw the stories in Saturday's State Journal about the potential sale of the Silver Dollar Bar and the possible redevelopment of that area opposite us on the corner of Fairchild and W. Mifflin. Perhaps you have questions about the implications of that redevelopment, as well as the Wisconsin History Center on the future of Grace Church, or whether, as was discussed in past years, Grace might be a part of any such development. Buried in the article was a detail that oldtimers might remember: Hovde Properties' efforts to redevelop this block date back to 1998. Also buried was another detail: that there are no firm plans in place for redevelopment and that the goal right now is to raze the area in preparation for construction of the Wisconsin History Center. It's also worth reminding ourselves that our own conversations with Hovde began in 2013 and have occurred off and on, mostly off, since then, with lengthy periods of silence.

The History Center will begin construction next year—a fitting symbol of the enormous changes taking place in Madison. There are construction cranes all over the city and in the suburbs, evidence of the growth we are experiencing. But underneath the growth are other enormous changes—changes in the way we live and work and spend our free time. Alongside the stories of development are other stories—of continued office vacancies; the state is ridding itself of office space in the downtown area, meaning more development, but what will come? As we ponder and observe the changing landscape of our neighborhood and our city, we are also called to reflect on our place in it, as stewards of a historic building and congregation, and as followers of Christ called to love God and our neighbor. The enormous changes taking place include not just a transformation of our lived environment but also of our community and connections. We are all too aware of the continuing racial and economic disparities, with crises in affordable housing, economic and educational opportunity, food insecurity, health care.

Grace has long had a reputation as a congregation that reaches out to those in need, with the men's shelter, the food pantry, and now our welcoming of the Off the Square Club, that ministers to some of the most vulnerable of our neighbors. The presence of the Off the Square Club, along with the arrival of Julia Weaver's ministry, now called "Uptown Sanctuary" means that there is much more activity in around Grace these days than there was even just a few months ago. The presence of their guests brings new opportunities for conversation and connection, even as it increases demands on staff and infrastructure.

I want to thank Vikki Enright, our Pantry Coordinator, who has brought the pantry through the challenging years of the pandemic and is leading it to face the new challenges that have come in its wake as federal funding has dried up and nonprofits struggle with staffing and volunteers to meet the increased need.

Through our Mission and Outreach Commidee, we have established a relationship with the Beacon, serving meals and offering mentorships. Father JF continues to engage with the Madison Area Jail Ministry, seeking to develop ways we might connect to another group of our closest neighbors. One area of outreach that is underappreciated is the importance of our beautiful courtyard garden, husbanded by John Andrews and other volunteers, and the Karlen garden on Carroll St— cared for by Barb Karlen with its Lidle Free Library. These oases of rest and beauty enhance the neighborhood and contribute to its appeal and livability. Our Pride Committee, organized and led by Olwen and Shelley Hansen-Blake is extending our welcome beyond our walls and gardens to LGBTQ+ people who are too often marginalized and demonized by our Christian siblings.

Of course, being stewards of a historic building brings challenges as well as opportunities. Right now, we are facing the challenge of a lifetime, replacing the slate roof on our nave. The roof commidee, whose report is included in the printed packet today, has been working incredibly hard over the last year. Under Deb Anken-Dyer's brilliant and tireless leadership, we have gathered the information we need, and thanks to Fred Groth who brings decades of professional expertise and familiarity with the building, he has assembled an expert team of consultants. We were disappointed that we were not awarded the grant from the Fund for Sacred Places that would have helped jumpstart our fundraising efforts, but in follow-up conversations they strongly encouraged us to reapply next year. We will be making a decision on that in the coming weeks, as we weigh the benefits of the possible grant against our timeline and the likelihood of increased costs if we delay.

No annual report would be complete without appropriate expressions of gratitude. This has been a year of staff transition, as we saw George Decker come and go as Parish Administrator. His vast administrative experience and wisdom helped to reorganize and update a number of systems and it was at his suggestion that we reorganized the staff structure in the way it is now, with Kristen Wold as Parish Administrator and Erin Schuurmans as Assistant Parish Administrator. I'm confident that the two of them will do a great job of helping us connect with each other and run an efficient office. I'm grateful as always to Carol for her support with liturgy and pastoral care and to JF for his energy, thoughful and provocative sermons and his assistance in many areas of ministry. Our music staff continues to do a great job and it is wonderful to have a full complement of paid singers alongside a growing number of parishioners in the choir.

I would like to single out Mary Ann Nanassy, our Kitchen Coordinator. She works incredibly hard and with great patience and grace in trying circumstances. Coffee hour is an important place where we connect with each other and build community but Mary Ann's ministry goes far beyond that. With volunteers, especially Francine Hartman and Jane Ferris, she has helped to minister to families, the congregation, and the wider community through difficult times of grief and mourning. The work she and the others do is a true spiritual gift to people who are hurting and facing decisions they've never had to make before. You all are a gij to our community, and to me. We are at a point of transition in our lay leadership as well, as Jane Hamblen steps away from the Senior Warden position. Her leadership has been amazing. She brings the insight and perspective of a lawyer and seasoned

position. Her leadership has been amazing. She brings the insight and perspective of a lawyer and seasoned administrator to the church's business. She has taught me a great deal and steered a steady course over the last two years. I'm looking forward to working with Amy Robinson, who has served as Junior Warden the last two years and will step into the Senior Warden position, god willing, and to Mary Schlaefer who has agreed to work as Junior Warden. Our leadership is in good hands for the foreseeable future. I would also like to thank our outgoing vestry members: Brigide Fielder, Rebecca Szymkowski, Eileen Hocker, and Bess Malson-Huddle who have helped to guide our common life this past year.

This has been a year of transition in other ways. So far, we've seen thirteen deaths in the parish—some of those were people who were only marginally connected to Grace. Others, like the Bolz's, like Gwen were pillars of our congregation, volunteering their time, energy, and gifts for decades, and supporting our ministries financially. They have already left gaping holes in our pews and in our congregational life. Like mainline churches in general, ours is an aging congregation, and those who have led it over the decades are stepping back. They will be missed. But in the next few years, we will need to be more effective, and more proactive in cultivating new leadership that will sustain our congregation in the coming years. Like a new roof that will last 80-100 years, incorporating new generations into our congregation will help sustain it for decades to come.

Another important transition, or possible transition, is taking place beyond our walls—the ongoing work toward reunification of the three Episcopal dioceses of Wisconsin. As you know, all three dioceses voted in favor of moving forward—in Eau Claire and Milwaukee, more than 90% voted in favor; in Fond du Lac, roughly 60%. There is work to be done on the structure and governance that will emerge, and work to be done in building relationships among Episcopalians across the state. The joint convention that will vote on reunification will take place on May 4. I hope you will pay close attention to the information about reunification that will come out over the next months and engage in the conversations that will take place. This is an opportunity to reimagine being the Episcopal Church in Wisconsin; inviting our creativity, courage, and faith to move us forward into a new era.

This brings me back to where I began today. In a few months, our block may look very different—the only buildings remaining intact the Hovde Building to our west, the Churchill building to our north, and of course, our own beloved Grace Church which has stood on this spot as a witness for 165 years. Just as we are being invited to imagine the future of the Episcopal Church in the state of Wisconsin, our changing built environment invites us to reimagine our role and witness in downtown Madison. How might we connect and cooperate with the new Wisconsin History Center? How might our presence as the oldest church edifice in Madison, the oldest building on Capitol Square help to tell the story of Wisconsin's history, and help to shape our neighborhoods future?

There are enormous challenges facing us, as a congregation, a community, a nation, a globe. I needn't list them all. It would be easy to succumb to the temptation to withdraw, to close in on ourselves, to seek to protect what we have, to live in the past. It would be easy to let our fears for the future and our nostalgia for the past overwhelm us. But our God is calling us into the future. When Jesus ascended into heaven, he let his disciples with what we know as the great commission, to go into all the world, to share the good news, to baptize, and make disciples. That is still what we are called to do. Those disciples didn't know what awaited them, what they would encounter but they stepped out in faith. So too must we, for Jesus' words s8ll call to us across the millennia; to share the good news, to make disciples. And he promised and us, another thing: "And remember, I am with you always, to the end of the age." With these words, Madhew ended his gospel and comfort us today. Jesus is with us always.



Grace Participates in Rally at the Capitol

On October 10, some 200 people gathered on the Capitol steps to protest the months-long lockdowns at Waupun, Green Bay, and Stanley correctional facilities, as well as other mistreatment of incarcerated persons. After the rally, people visited legislators to express their concerns and delivered a letter to Gov. Evers' office. WISDOM and its Madison affiliate, MOSES, organized the event.

Grace Church was represented by Shelley Hansen-Blake, Lynn Felhoffer, Georgeanne Cusic, Jonathan Grieser, Steve and Susan Webster, and Margaret Irwin. Many thanks to them, to those who wanted to participate but couldn't come, as well as to the poster-makers at the Sunday coffee hour. We shared our extra posters with other participants.

Reunification moves forward

In their conventions held concurrently on October 21, the dioceses of Eau Claire, Fond du Lac, and Milwaukee all voted in favor of the resolution to move forward with drafting a plan for reunification of the three dioceses. That plan will be developed over the coming months with a final vote coming at a joint convention on May 4, 2024. After that, the reunification proposal will have to be approved by the General Convention of the Episcopal Church, which meets in Lexington, KY in June, 2024.

The October/November MOSES newsletter has arrived! The newsletter is an easy way to stay informed about important issues in the criminal legal system that Christians need to know about. The lead story covers the October 10 rally at the Capitol to end the ongoing prison lock downs. Another involves the change in retention of eviction-filing records that MOSES helped promote.

Community and Compline on Thursdays in Advent




- 1. Cookie pieces for your gingerbread house. Store-bought is easiest, but feel free to bring your homemade pieces.
